Suggested Projects:

- (i) A 2000 characters long term paper to be submitted at the end of the Vth semester, prepared in consultation with the faculty in the department.
- (ii) A 2000 characters long book review of an academic work in Chinese/English/Hindi pertaining to Sinology, India-China relations, to be submitted at the end of the Vth semester.

The project has the scope of readings being suggested as per the term paper/book review project of the learner.

Evaluation and Assessment of Internship, Industrial Training, and Community Outreach.

1. Internship/Apprenticeship

Internship and Apprenticeship involve students participating in professional activities or work experiences under the supervision of an expert from an external entity. These experiences aim to induct students into real-world work situations, providing practical experience, deeper subject understanding, and confidence-building. **Monitoring:**

- Regularity: Teacher monitors student attendance and activity at the workplace.
- Activity Logbook: Students maintain a logbook, regularly checked by the teacher.
- Progress Assessment: Teacher assesses each student's progress bi-weekly.
- Leave Notification: Students must inform both the monitoring teacher and supervisor of any leave at least one day in advance, except in emergencies.
- Workplace Monitoring: Supervisor at the workplace also monitors the student's progress.
- Feedback: Teacher gathers feedback from the Internship/Apprenticeship Supervisor regarding student performance.

Final Assessment:

- Seminar Presentation/Viva-Voce: Evaluated by an expert committee consisting of the Monitoring Teacher, Internship/Apprenticeship Supervisor, and an External Expert (If required).
- Evaluation Criteria:
 - Activity logbook and supervisor's evaluation report.
 - Quality of the presentation and intern's report.

- Skills acquired by the student.
- Originality and innovative contributions.
- Significance of the outcomes achieved.

2. Community Outreach

Community Outreach aims to promote social responsibility and civic engagement among students, helping them understand and address social issues while developing empathy and compassion.

Monitoring:

- Regularity: Teacher ensures student's consistent participation in community activities.
- Activity Logbook: Students maintain a logbook detailing their community work.
- Progress Assessment: Teacher reviews progress every two weeks.
- Leave Notification: Students should notify the teacher and community outreach supervisor of any leave.
- Supervisor's Feedback: Teacher collects observations from the community outreach supervisor.

Final Assessment:

- Seminar Presentation/Viva-Voce: Evaluated by an expert committee consisting of the Monitoring Teacher, Community Outreach Supervisor, and an External Expert.
- Evaluation Criteria:
 - 1. Activity logbook and supervisor's evaluation report.
 - 2. Quality of the presentation and report on community outreach.
 - Understanding and addressing of social issues:
 - Empathy and compassion demonstrated.
 - Contribution to community welfare or problem-solving.

General Guidelines for Implementation:

- Engagement: Students must engage with industries, organizations, or communities relevant to their field.
- MoU Requirement: Colleges must have MoUs with relevant entities before offering these
 opportunities.
- Flexibility: Students can choose working days in consultation with the engaging entity, communicated to the monitoring teacher.

Teacher Workload:

- Section Size: Two hours per week for a section of 25-30 students.
- Smaller Groups: One hour per week for 5-10 students.
- Maximum Load: Two hours per week per teacher.

By adhering to these guidelines, the program ensures that students gain valuable practical experience, develop essential skills, and foster social responsibility, preparing them for future careers and contributing positively to society.

Suggested Continuous Evaluation Methods: Class participation, presentations.
